PLC Inquiry Cycle presentations

A PLC (Professional Learning Community) Inquiry Cycle is a structured process used by educators to collaboratively improve teaching practices and student outcomes. This cycle involves identifying areas for improvement, planning and implementing strategies, observing the results and then reflecting on these outcomes to refine approaches further.

The purpose of the PLC Inquiry Cycle is to foster continuous educational improvement through collaborative learning and shared expertise.



Last week, we held our Term 1 PLC Inquiry Cycle presentations, where each learning community shared their discoveries and advancements with the rest of the staff. The standard of the presentations were really impressive, effectively highlighting the high quality of teaching and learning occurring throughout our school. These sessions not only showcased our commitment to educational excellence but also reinforced the value of collaborative professional development in enhancing our instructional practices.

Attitudes to School Survey

Later this term, students from Year 4 to 6 will participate in the annual Attitudes to School Survey. This survey, provided by the Department of Education, enables our students to express their views and experiences at school. We will use the insights gained from the survey to pinpoint and tackle areas for improvement, thereby enriching our students' educational experience.



Swimming

In Term 3, we are very excited to have our Prep - 6 swimming programs at Toby Haenan Swim Centre in Chelsea Heights. The program caters to swimmers of all abilities and all students will have the opportunity to participate in the program. A brief assessment will take place during the first session to view the current students ability and identify their swimming needs. The dates are below:

Year 3-6: Monday 15th - Friday 19th July.

Prep - Year 2: Monday 9th - Friday 13th September.

Swimming is an essential skill to have in Australia and particularly when living in Keysborough due to the proximity to open water at the local beaches. Learning basic swimming skills can ensure safety around water, which is an essential lifelong skill. To ensure your child's participation in the event, a deposit of \$50 is due by Friday 24th May. Final costing of the event will be communicated after this date and will be dependent on confirmed numbers.

DISABILITY INCLUSION IN VICTORIAN GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS

If you have or know someone with a child with disability, they may benefit from Disability Inclusion. This is the new, strengths-based approach to supporting students with disability at school and has a focus on what they can achieve, rather than what they can't.

Your child's teacher and the Inclusion Leader will work with you to create a Disability Inclusion Profile (DIP)

if required. The Profile is a written description of your child's strengths and needs at school. It will help the school give your child the support they need, as an individual and as a member of the school community.

Disability Inclusion also delivers more school funding and support for more training and professional development for teachers and school staff.

For students, Disability Inclusion means:

- a positive focus through a strengths-based approach
- opportunity to talk about goals and educational needs
- better support through greater school-wide resources.

For families, Disability Inclusion means:

• a process that considers the strengths, aspirations and needs of their child

• more confidence that their local school can support their child, regardless of whether they have a formal diagnosis

• better access to information about their child's learning needs and adjustments.

Disability Inclusion is being implemented at KGPS this year. The Program for Students with Disabilities will no longer continue to be implemented.

What can you do?

Ensure frequent communication with the school which will assist staff to cater for your child's individual needs.

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Provide the school with relevant and necessary information or documentation relating to your child's development and needs. This includes reports from professionals such as *paediatricians, psychologists, allied health professionals, therapists, NDIS, etc.* The more information the school

has regarding your child's development, the better equipped they are to provide the correct, targeted support.

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If your child is in out-of-home care, talk to their Department of Families, Fairness and Housing Case Manager or LOOKOUT Early Childhood Learning Advisor to ensure the child's legal guardian is informed about Disability Inclusion and provided with the fact sheet.

If you have or know someone with a child with a disability at a government school, they may benefit from Disability Inclusion. This approach puts the needs of the student at the heart of the school's response – focusing on what a child can achieve, rather than what they can't.

SUPPORTING THE LEARNER PROFILE AT HOME Cultivating Thinkers at Home

In this week's "Supporting the Learner Profile at Home," we turn our focus to the attribute of being a "Thinker." Thinkers apply critical and creative thinking skills to make reasoned, ethical decisions. They are problem solvers and innovators.

Below are some activities that you can take part in with your child/ren to help develop their understanding of being knowledgeable.

- 1. Problem-solving Games: Play games like "Simon Says," or puzzles which encourage logical thinking.
- 2.Story Sequencing: After reading a story, ask your child to retell it in order. This fosters comprehension and recall.
- 3.Art Projects: Encourage creativity by providing materials for your child to create their own artwork.
- 4. Scenarios: Create hypothetical scenarios and ask your child how they would respond, promoting ethical thinking.
- 5. Brain Teasers: Encourage your child to solve riddles, brain teasers, or Sudoku to stimulate logical thinking.
- 6.Innovation Challenge: Ask your child to design a new gadget or solve a common problem in an innovative way.
- 7.Debates: Encourage friendly debates on topics of interest or ethical dilemmas to foster critical thinking.
- 8. Creative Writing: Encourage your child to write short stories, poems or journal entries, which stimulate creative and reflective thinking.

By engaging in these activities, we can help our children develop into thinkers who are equipped to tackle challenges creatively and ethically.

#12 Communication Skills: Expressing Ideas Clearly and Respectfully

In our exploration of the Approaches to Learning (ATL) within the PYP, this newsletter highlights Communication Skills. Effective communication is essential for learning, building relationships and participating in a global society.

What are Communication Skills in PYP?

Communication skills in the PYP context involve expressing ideas clearly and responsibly, understanding and interpreting the communication of others and using a range of communication tools and strategies.

Family Debate Night Activity

To enhance communication skills, we invite families to hold a "Family Debate Night." This activity can help develop articulation, listening and respectful argumentation skills.

Steps for Family Debate Night:

- 1. Choose a Topic: Pick a topic that is interesting and suitable for all family members.
- 2. **Set Ground Rules:** Ensure everyone understands the importance of respectful and constructive debate.
- 3. Prepare: Give everyone time to prepare their arguments.
- 4. Debate: Take turns presenting your viewpoints and listening to others.
- 5. **Reflect:** Discuss what everyone learned from the experience.

Share Your Debate Night: We would love to hear about your debate topics and what you learned. Share your experiences with Steve Gammon, our Assistant Principal and PYP Coordinator via Compass.

Family Debate Night is not just about winning an argument; it's about learning to communicate effectively, listen actively and respect different viewpoints.

Engaging in meaningful and respectful communication is a skill that benefits everyone. We can't wait to see how your family debates bring new ideas and understanding to light!
