Our school is conducting a survey to find out what parents/caregivers/guardians think of our school. The survey is an annual survey offered by the Department of Education and Training, that is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour and student engagement. A random sample of approximately 30 per cent of parents/caregivers/guardians have been selected to participate in this year's survey. The data from the survey is published annually on the 'My Schools' website and is included in the School's Annual Report. The data is used to identify our school's strengths as well as areas to further develop. The survey opens next week. #### **Empathy**

This term our school value focus is Empathy. Empathy is a key part of being a helpful and responsible community member. Empathy helps people understand and work with others and take action to help those around them.

Empathy is a key ingredient in positive friendships and relationships. It reduces conflict and misunderstandings and leads to helping behaviour, kindness, and even greater success in life in general.

And like any skill, empathy can be taught and developed in children.

On our Curriculum Day last term our staff developed activities to enhance our students understanding of what Empathy is and what it may look like in a variety of settings or events. Throughout the term all classes will be focusing on the following positive statements.

I consider the feelings of others I celebrate other accomplishmen and feel happy f them	upstander	I work together and play nicely with others	I give positive feedback to others in an activity
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Here are some ways you can support your child to learn more about Empathy.

#### 1.Show empathy to kids when they're upset.

<u>Being sensitive</u> to how kids are feeling can help them understand what it's like for other people when someone shows empathy. Here's what that might look like:

You're getting dinner ready and your child is demanding ice cream. Instead of getting angry, try to let your child know that you understand that feeling. You might say. "I know you really want ice cream now. But the rule is dinner first, then dessert. Let's put on the timer to show exactly what time you can have ice-cream."

#### 2. Discuss alternative strategies.

Do this when your child is calm, not in the heat of the moment. You might say, "You did a good job waiting until after dinner for ice cream. But what else could we have said or done to make our conversation about it more pleasant?"

#### 3. Raise awareness of nonverbal cues.

Some children struggle to pick up on social cues. For example, downcast eyes and slumped posture might not register as "sad" to them. They may need help recognising the messages from different types of body language, facial expressions, and tones of voice, and knowing what they each mean.

#### 4. Play games.

Learning empathy can be fun. Sit on a bench at the playground. Try to guess the mood of people who walk by, and explain what clues made you think a person was happy, sad, or mad.

This kind of game helps your child tune in to how expressions, body language, and tone of voice can show how someone feels.

#### 5. Role-play different scenarios.

Some children have trouble imagining how another person feels. Acting out scenarios, such as not being invited to a birthday party, can make it easier for your child to see another person's point of view.

#### 6. Model empathy in the moment.

When your child shows a lack of empathy in a social situation, model empathy. For example, maybe during the walk to school, another child drops an art project. Your child laughs. You may be tempted to correct your child on the spot. Instead, jump in to help the other child. You might say, "Can I help you put it back together?

## 7. Feature pets in discussions about feelings.

This strategy can lighten the discussion. For example, when your cat is at the window, entranced by a bird, you can ask, "What do you think Sparky is thinking? Would now be a good time to pet him?" If the dog prances with joy when your child walks through the door, ask, "Would Sadie feel sad if you ignored her?"

#### 8. Be ready to change tactics slightly.

If the "How would you feel..." strategy isn't working, move the spotlight to yourself. You can say something like, "I remember a time when I was waiting in line at McDonalds and it was taking forever. And then someone didn't see there was a line and they gave their order before I could!" Talking about how you felt — instead of making your child the centre of the action — can be a subtle, helpful change. It helps your child focus on another person's feelings. And it can make the discussion feel less intense for a child who's tired of being "talked to" about social skills.

- Coach their SOCIAL SKILLS.

## 5-7 YEARS Use PICTURES - Cut out

- Use PICTURES Cut out pictures from magazines or print pictures that show sad, angry, or happy faces.
- EMBRACE DIVERSITY Help children understand what they have in common with others.
- OBSERVE OTHERS Note the body language of others and guess how they might be feeling.
- Teach about HEALTHY LIMITS and their own boundaries.



#### 7-9 YEARS

- Engage in highlevel DISCUSSIONS about book characters.
- Try loving kindness MEDITATION.
- Engage in cooperative BOARD GAMES.



#### 9-11 YEARS

- Sign up for ACTING CLASSES.
- Create EMPATHY MAPS - Choose an emotion, then brainstorm what you might say, think, and do when you feel that way.

#### 12+ YEARS

- Discuss current EVENTS.
- Encourage your child to choose VOLUNTEER WORK.



- 4. Reflect: Discuss the impact of your actions and what you learned about responsibility.




